

### THE SIXTEENTH SUNDAY AFTER TRINITY Sunday, September 27th 2020



#### Dear Friends

These are disorientating and anxious times for most of us. We are now in the geographical area of a new "lockdown" and there is every possibility that with the "second wave" of the coronavirus things may well get worse before they get better. I certainly don't say this to add to your sense of sadness or struggle but it is important to be honest and real. There is also a parallel situation now for us as a church. Very many of you have written movingly to me thanking me and my family for our ministry here as we have announced our leave-taking. I have tried to reply to you all, and I am deeply grateful for all the kind words that have been written and spoken, and the graciousness and thankfulness expressed. However, I am far from immune to the sense of deep uncertainty and anxiety that this also brings for many of you. In biblical terms, our Bishop Nick summed much of this up in the Ad Clerum he sent on Thursday of this week following the Prime Minister's recent announcement:

When the pandemic began and we went into lockdown in March I indicated that the collapse of our diaries, routines and assumptions about life and ministry brought us into line with the experience – the normality – of most people across the planet. The stripping away of these assumptions and certainties is painful, but can also be a gift. We are not now in a temporarily changed world; we are in a different one and we are all in the same place. 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When the people of Israel were led out from over 400 years of captivity in Egypt they had to spend 40 years in the desert learning to let go and prepare. They had to let go of expectations of what life might hold, however good or bad that might have been. They had to lose patterns of living, communing, worshipping and organising. As we know, their first instinct was to go back to what they had known – romanticising the past, being disorientated in the present and fearing the future. And all of this was natural. Which was why they needed a generation in the middle of nowhere before they could be ready to enter a new land and establish ways of living together that were significantly different from what they had hitherto known.

Where do we go from here? There are now almost three months exactly to the conclusion of my ministry amongst you. These will be important days for us to think and plan together for future ministry in this place. In the coming weeks I shall try to write about some of these in this weekly newsletter. I shall try to do this above all to encourage us, to give us a sense of vision and hope about where the coming processes and vacancy may lead, and the renewed transformation that can bring. I hope over the last thirteen years we have, under God, shown what is possible when we to listen to the Holy Spirit, and then roll up our sleeves and join in! There have always been "the murmurings of the people of Israel". Moses had to put up with them, and there will always be those in any community who choose the self-indulgence of the same cul-de-sac. Rather, the biblical model shows us that through the desert experience of "betwixt and between" a new future will emerge when we show our faithfulness to God.

Today, I want to invite those of you who are anxious and have specific questions about what is going to happen at St Margaret's to be in contact with me. Our present "lockdown" means our normal means of being together, meeting and talking to each other, are mostly cut off. For some while now I have had to limit my physical visiting to those whose needs are acute, or who are approaching the end of their lives and need the specific ministry of a priest. This is continuing but the new lockdown rules mean I have to be especially careful not to become a person who can transmit the virus to others or from place to place. So please do contact me if you have particular concerns and I will try to address them as honestly as I can: if you prefer to write either physically or by e-mail, then please do so; if you prefer to telephone, then I may or may not be able to answer immediately, but if you leave a voicemail and a number to call I will get back to you as soon as I can.


