THE SECOND SUNDAY BEFORE LENT Sunday, February 7th 2021

Collect

Almighty God, you have created the heavens and the earth and made us in your own image: teach us to discern your hand in all your works and your likeness in all your children; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who with you and the Holy Spirit reigns supreme over all things, now and for ever. **Amen.**

First Reading Colossians 1. 15-20

Christ is the image of the invisible God, the firstborn of all creation; for in him all things in heaven and on earth were created, things visible and invisible, whether thrones or dominions or rulers or powers—all things have been created through him and for him. He himself is before all things, and in him all things hold together. He is the head of the body, the church; he is the beginning, the firstborn from the dead, so that he might come to have first place in everything. For in him all the fullness of God was pleased to dwell, and through him God was pleased to reconcile to himself all things, whether on earth or in heaven, by making peace through the blood of his cross.

Second Reading John 1. 1-14

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it. There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. He came as a witness to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him. He himself was not the light, but he

came to testify to the light. The true light, which enlightens everyone, was coming into the world. He was in the world, and the world came into being through him; yet the world did not know him. He came to what was his own, and his own people did not accept him. But to all who received him, who believed in his name, he gave power to become children of God, who were born, not of blood or of the will of the flesh or of the will of man, but of God. And the Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth.

Lent Reading

This year, the available Lent literature is understandably focused on reading and praying at home, often alone. Here are some Lent titles worth considering, all of which are currently available on Amazon: Thy Will be Done by Stephen Cherry (Dean, Kings College, Cambridge) Bloomsbury £7.38. This book is an invitation to immerse yourself in the prayer that Jesus taught his disciples. The book is divided into six parts, all of which focus on one clause of the Lord's Prayer. Each consists of six chapters. It provides short daily readings, six days a week, from the Sunday before Ash Wednesday to the Sunday after Easter Day. The Sanctuary for Lent 2012 by April Casperson. USA £11.18. The Sanctuary for Lent contains brief readings for each day in Lent, including a suggested scripture reading, a short devotion and a short prayer - all based on the lectionary. This pamphlet is intended to help readers faithfully journey through Lent as they prepare to experience the joy of the Resurrection. Rooted in Love: Lent reflections on the Life of Christ by Sarah Mullallay, Bishop of London, and her Area Bishops. SPCK £8.19. Who is the Christ we serve? What does it mean to be part of the body of Christ? How can we live more Christ-centred lives? Here are forty reflections that lead us deeper into the meaning and practice of life in Christ today. Drawing on the collective wisdom of all the area bishops in the Diocese of London each reflection includes a Bible reading, a prayer and a suggestion for action based on the reading. The result is an exceptionally helpful Lent book, offering a rich array of biblical insight and spiritual guidance that Christians of all traditions will warmly welcome and appreciate. Living the Story: Revealing the extraordinary love of God in ordinary ways by Hannah Steele. SPCK £7.99. The Archbishop of Canterbury's Lent Book 2021. In Living His Story, Hannah Steele uncovers liberating and practical ways of sharing the gospel afresh. With warmth and encouragement, she shows how we can live Jesus' story in our own lives simply by being the people God made us and allowing people to be drawn to him though our natural gifts.
