We are delighted to share with you the formal announcement from the Bishop of Leeds on the appointment of our new vicar - The Revd Alex Crawford. Thank you to everyone who has contributed to the recruitment process - your support, dedication and prayers have all played a vital role. We look forward to welcoming Fr Alex and his family to St. Margaret's.

The Bishop of Leeds is pleased to announce that The Revd Alex Crawford, currently Assistant Curate at St Helen Low Fell and the parish of Bensham and Teams (St Chad's Church) in the Diocese of Durham, has been appointed as Incumbent of St Margaret's Ilkley in the Bradford Episcopal Area.

The date of the licensing will be announced in due course.

Prior to ordination, Fr Alex read Theology at University College, Durham, and worked at Durham Cathedral for four years as the Liturgical Assistant. He trained for ordained ministry at the College of the Resurrection in Mirfield, before serving his title at two churches in Gateshead.

Fr Alex is married to Natalie, and they have five children who are very excited to meet everyone: Joscelyn (8), Evelyn (6), Madeleine (4), George (2), and Amelia (5 months).

Fr Alex says: "I am humbled and delighted to have been called to serve your wonderful parish at St Margaret's. From the moment I saw the parish brochure, I felt that this is where I needed to be. I am incredibly grateful that the Holy Spirit and the interview panel both felt likewise! Natalie and I are looking forward to making a return to West Yorkshire, and getting to know the parish and community really well. You are all in my prayers as we await the move."

Letter from Fr Bernard **Do You Believe in Angels?**

In a recent Gallup poll 72% of Americans said they believed in angels. While in Britain the figure was only 32%. We at St. Margaret's must find it hard not to believe in angels seeing that we have 87 angels in the church, and one outside the Parish Hall. They are carved in wood and stone, but most appear in the windows, particularly in our great east and west windows.

The philosopher and theologian, Thomas Aquinas (1225-74), wrote "The entire corporeal world is governed by God through the angels. They are combined with the physical creation to form one total world."

So they are not just fancy decoration, but they remind us of two important truths. Firstly, that our own death is not the end of our existence. When we die, we go to a place which Jesus has prepared for us, see John 14, 1-6. Whoever believes in Him shall not perish but have everlasting life. John 3. 16.

Secondly, that the angels play important roles in the life of heaven. They are not human beings who have been promoted or "given their wings". They are a distinct part of the creation, and one important part they play, is by being God's messengers. They don't always appear in angelic dress like the Angel Gabriel's visit to Mary. But often they come in the form of ordinary people. There are many instances of this in the Bible. Next week I will tell you of my experience of an angelic message given through a person I met for only a few minutes.

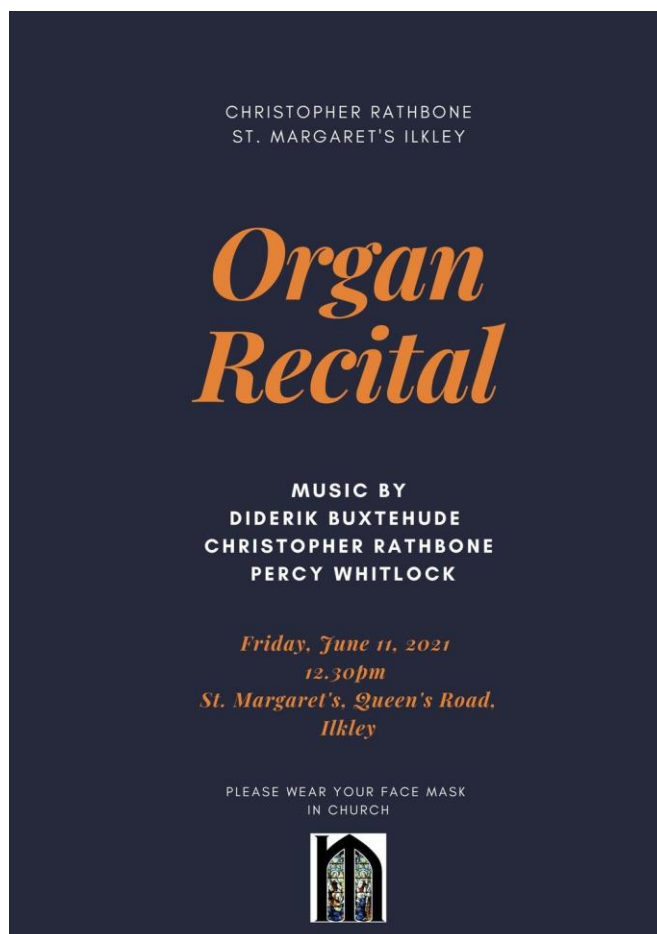

Organ Recital

Friday, June 11th at 12.30pm

Our organ recital series resumes on Friday, June 11th. There is no need to book in advance but you will need to sign in on the day for Track & Trace purposes.

We look forward to welcoming back many of our former loyal audience, and perhaps some new faces who would enjoy half an hour of beautiful music for the 'King of Instruments'. The first recital has a varied programme of music which is all based on hymn-tunes – after all, many of us have been dying to sing a few hymns during the long pandemic months!

Diderik **Buxtehude**, one of Bach's most important predecessors, and probably the Great Dane among composers, wrote a few extended fantasias based on Chorales (hymns) which were important to him: this one, Nun freut euch, is a jubilant hymn by Martin Luther, set to a tune probably also by Luther (it's called 'Luther's Tune' in the New English Hymnal). Buxtehude manages to sustain a wonderfully inventive sequence of variants which lasts nearly 15 minutes.

I shall follow this with a set of seven short hymn-tune preludes that I wrote in January (you've got to do something in lockdown, with no services to plan and direct, no recitals to rehearse...) based on familiar hymns for the season, including Repton (Dear Lord and Father), Just as I am, Schmücke dich (Deck thyself, my soul), and Crúger (Hail to the Lord's anointed) – this is a mini-Toccata!

To finish I shall play a masterpiece by Percy **Whitlock**, who died of Tuberculosis at the tender age of 43 in 1946. His last published work was a set of 6 Hymn-tune preludes, and no 3 is an exciting piece based on Deo gracias, a hymn-tune based on the 15th century Agincourt Song (Our King went forth to Normandy.) It is commonly sung nowadays to 'Forth in the peace of Christ we go (NEH 361.). *Christopher Rathbone*.
