

Opening Hymn 200 (48)

Collect O God, you know us to be set in the midst of so many and great dangers, that by reason of the frailty of our nature we cannot always stand upright: grant to us such strength and protection as may support us in all dangers and carry us through all temptations; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. **Amen.**

First Reading 1 Corinthians 15. 1-11

I would remind you, brothers and sisters, of the good news that I proclaimed to you, which you in turn received, in which also you stand, through which also you are being saved, if you hold firmly to the message that I proclaimed to you—unless you have come to believe in vain. For I handed on to you as of first importance what I in turn had received: that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the scriptures, and that he was buried, and that he was raised on the third day in accordance with the scriptures, and that he appeared to Cephas, then to the twelve. Then he appeared to more than five hundred brothers and sisters at one time, most of whom are still alive, though some have died. Then he appeared to James, then to all the apostles. Last of all, as to someone untimely born, he appeared also to me. For I am the least of the apostles, unfit to be called an apostle, because I persecuted the church of God. But by the grace of God I am what I am, and his grace towards me has not been in vain. On the contrary, I worked harder than any of them—though it was not I, but the grace of God that is with me. Whether then it was I or they, so we proclaim and so you have come to believe.

Gospel Reading Luke 5. 1-11

While Jesus was standing beside the lake of Gennesaret, and the crowd was pressing in on him to hear the word of God, he saw two boats there at the shore of the lake; the fishermen had gone out of them and were washing their nets. He got into one of the boats, the one belonging to Simon, and asked him to put out a little way from the shore. Then he sat down and taught the crowds from the boat. When he had finished speaking, he said to Simon, 'Put out into the deep water and let down your nets for a catch.' Simon answered, 'Master, we have worked all night long but have caught nothing. Yet if you say so, I will let down the nets.' When they had done this, they caught so many fish that their nets were beginning to break. So they signalled to their partners in the other boat to come and help them. And they came and filled both boats, so that they began to sink. But when Simon Peter saw it, he fell down at Jesus' knees, saying, 'Go away from me, Lord, for I am a sinful man!' For he and all who were with him were amazed at the catch of fish that they had taken; and so also were James and John, sons of Zebedee, who were partners with Simon. Then Jesus said to Simon, 'Do not be afraid; from now on you will be catching people.' When they had brought their boats to shore, they left everything and followed Jesus.

Parish statement on the lifting of Covid restrictions

Many will be glad to see that the Government has relaxed Covid mitigations from Thursday 27 January; others will understandably continue to be concerned about the prevalence of the virus and its potential effects. As such, like good Anglicans, we hope to navigate a 'middle way' that enables those who are anxious about the risks in coming to church to feel as safe as possible, while bringing us into line with Government and Church of England guidance.

We will continue to reflect on our practices as we move into the spring, and make further amendments as appropriate. But for now, please be patient and generous with us and with each other as we move into what we hope will be the final phase of the pandemic, together; and if in doubt, to err on the side of caution (for example, although masks are no longer required in church, if you find yourself in close proximity to others for an extended time, it might be the kindest thing to wear one).

Here are the main changes to our current set up which are now in place:

- Masks. As I've just mentioned, masks are no longer required when in the church or the hall; but given that the number of cases remains high, we encourage you to consider the Government's advice to wear one through the remainder of the winter. Welcomers and servers will continue to wear masks for the time being.
- **Distancing**. Issues of social distancing, sharing the peace, and so on, are now a matter of individual choice; but please be aware that others may not be comfortable being close to one another or making physical contact yet.
- Communion Low Mass. We will restore communication of the chalice at all Low Masses (8.00 am Sundays, 6.15 pm Tuesdays and festivals, 11.00 am Thursdays and feasts). You are very welcome to continue receiving in one kind for the time being if you would prefer.
- **Communion Sung Mass**. Administration of communion at the Sung Mass (10.45 am Sundays and 7.30 pm feasts) and the Family Mass (9.15 am once a month) will continue to be in one kind for the time being, and from standing stations in the crossing; again working on the principle of the 'middle way' that enables everyone to feel as comfortable as possible at our principal Eucharistic celebrations.

If you have any comments or concerns, please do talk to me or one of the wardens. I hope you feel this is an appropriate way forward in the short term.
