Just then there was in their synagogue a man with an unclean spirit, and he cried out, 'What have you to do with us, Jesus of Nazareth? Have you come to destroy us? I know who you are, the Holy One of God.' But Jesus rebuked him, saying, 'Be silent, and come out of him!' And the unclean spirit, throwing him into convulsions and crying with a loud voice, came out of him. They were all amazed, and they kept on asking one another, 'What is this? A new teaching—with authority! He commands even the unclean spirits, and they obey him.' At once his fame began to spread throughout the surrounding region of Galilee.

Parish Pilgrimage to Durham

I would really like to organise a parish pilgrimage to the Shrine of St Cuthbert in Durham Cathedral, almost unique among English shrines in still containing the original saintly remains. St Bede is also buried in the cathedral (as is part of St Oswald). If we stayed for two or even three nights, we could take a trip up to Lindisfarne, and explore the spirituality of more of the northern saints in that beautiful and holy place. Just outside Durham is the ruin of Finchale Priory, the site of the hermitage of St Godric (d. 1170), who is the earliest-known composer of songs in English for which the original music exists – we could hear his music sung while we pray amidst the ruins! There are lots of other lovely possibilities, including worship in "the best cathedral on planet earth" (Bill Bryson).

At this stage it would be helpful to know a rough number of pilgrims, so please let me know if you'd like to be involved. I imagine we'd look at two or three nights in early June, staying together in a Premier Inn or similar, and perhaps hiring a minibus to travel there and back. Fr Alex.

The Feast of Candlemas Friday 2 February

Candlemas, or the Presentation of Christ in the Temple, draws the long Christmas season to its close. Join us at **11.00 am** for Low Mass, or **7.30 pm** for Sung Mass with candles lit throughout the church and a glass of wine afterwards. Lent comes very quickly this year, and the liturgy at 7.30 pm ends by literally turning us away from the crib at the east, and towards the font at the west, the symbol of Christ's tomb, as we prepare for the holy season. We also have Christopher's organ recital at 12.30 pm (see below).
